

- Have you ever heard of these famous women?



<u>Marie Curie</u> I did ground-breaking research on radioactivity that led to the treatment of many illnesses.



<u>Sarah Al-Amiri</u> I am the scientist in charge of the United Arab Emirate's missions which is sending space probe, Hope, to Mars.



<u>Dr. Maggie Aderin-Pocock</u> After working for the MoD, I returned to a job I loved; building instruments to explore the wonders of space.

Here are some more examples of inspirational women. Can you think of any examples of women who inspire you?



Helen Sharman became the first Briton in space as part of Project Juno in 1989. After responding to a radio advertisement looking for the first British astronaut, she was selected for the mission ahead of 13,000 other hopefuls.



Michelle Obama She is a lawyer and author. She was the first Black First Lady of the United States.



Saima Razaaq Salma Razaak is a British political activist and educator and she campaigns for LGBTQ+ inclusive education in schools. She was the first Muslim woman to lead a Pride parade in Britain.



English chemist **Rosalind Franklin** identified the structure of DNA long before the 'official discoverers' James Watson and Francis Crick. At the time, Franklin was never given any credit for her work.
