Healthy Bites

Keyworth Primary School have been working with the charity organisation School Food Matters on their 'Healthy Zones Programme'.

Healthy Zones involves everyone across the school community - from parents, catering staff and students. Currently, Keyworth is reviewing the School Food Policy to ensure healthy food is prioritised throughout the school day. Keyworth are also looking at ways to motivate children and families to make healthier choices around food.

As the programme rolls out, we will keep you informed of activities and events that will support this intent. This week, the children have been asked to complete a questionnaire about the food that they choose to eat in and outside of school. This will inform the upcoming programme of work.

Swap Crisps for Crudités

Sliced cucumber, carrot, peppers and sugar snap peas are a much healthier option than a bag of crisps. Keeping a plate of fresh vegetables in the fridge is terrific for children who like to graze between meals. Mixed vegetable crudités are rich in fibre, iron, calcium and some are carotenoids.
