### AIMS

- To understand how phonics and reading are taught at Bessemer and across the Gem Federation
- Explain the Year 1 Phonics Screening Check
- Share ideas and resources which you can use to support your child at home

### WHAT IS PHONICS?

• The alphabet contains only 26 letters. Spoken English uses about 42 sounds. We call these phonemes.

• These phonemes are represented by letters (graphemes). In other words, a sound can be represented by a letter (e.g. 's' or 'h') or a group of letters (e.g. 'sh' or 'ear')

• Once children begin learning sounds, they are used quickly to read and spell words.

#### PHONICS TERMS

- Phoneme (sound)
- Grapheme (letter formation) e.g. sh
- Segmenting (breaking word into sounds)
- Blending (putting sounds together to make words)

### **SOME TERMINOLOGY**

**Digraph**- 2 letters making one sound cow the children should say this as c-ow and not c-o-w

Trigraphs- 3 letters making one sound night the children should say this as n-igh-t and not n-i-g-h-t which does not sound like night.

<u>Split digraphs-</u> 2 vowels with a consonant in between. Sometimes this can be known as the magic e... spine - i\_e home - o\_e cube - u e


Encourage your child to use their knowledge of sounds to work out the words when reading and writing.


### HOW WE TEACH PHONICS


- Children have a 20 minute phonics lesson everyday.
- Children are taught to read by breaking down words 'graphemes' into separate sounds or 'phonemes'.
- They are then taught how to blend these sounds together to hear and read the whole word.

# Eagle Eye


Can you spot your tricky words?

Can you look for your tricky

Can you see something in the picture that starts with that sound or letter?

## Duck Hands



Can you use your duck hands and eat your sounds? What do you think the word is? Don't forget to use your eagle eye first as this can help you spot those tricky diagraphs and trigraphs!

### Build-it Beaver

Use your Build it Bever to help you build the words.

Once you have found the tricky sounds in the word, Say one sound at a time and 'build it' on to the last.

Break a longer word into smaller chunks!


This will make it easier to sound them out and then you can put the chunks back together.

# Trying Lion


Can you reread your sentence to check it makes sense?

If it doesn't sound right go back and try a different reading strategy.

If the short vowel sound doesn't make sense try the long vowel sound instead.





# Stretchy Snake




Stretch out your words so that you can hear your sounds!

# WHAT YOU CAN DO AT HOME TO HELP YOUR CHILD TO READ AT HOME...

- Play 'I spy' using sounds as well as letter names, e.g. 'I spy something beginning with sh'.
- Create a sound box. Ask your child to find things around the house containing a certain sound. (They could draw pictures and write the words too)
- Sound sort- you write words and have your child read them and sort them into the different columns.
- Matching Rhymes- Give your child a word and ask them to write down rhyming words containing the same sounds.
- Segment words and have your child blend them back together
- Play dough- Get your child to make words or sounds out of play dough.
- Play Buried Treasure- sorting real words/ nonsense words
- Write your own alien words- child to read these/ sort them into their sound groups
- Continue reading at home with your child.


# WHAT IS THE PHONICS SCREENING CHECKP


- It is a statutory phonics screening that every Year I child will be taking in June.
- The check consists of a list of 40 words.
- Half of these are real words and half nonsense words.
- The nonsense words will be shown to your child with a picture of an alien. This makes the check a bit more fun, and it also provides the children with a context for the nonsense word which is different to any existing vocabulary they may have.

#### It is not a reading test!

# • The check is very similar to tasks the children already complete during phonics lessons and it will be done with the class teacher.

- The focus of the check is to ensure that all children can read by the end of Year 2.
- The Year 1 screening (mid point) will provide evidence to help teachers plan for Year 2.





#### Why Pseudo Words/non- words / nonsense words / alien words?

Non-words are important to include as they can't be read using their vocabulary or from memory; they have to use their decoding skills. This is a fair way to assess all children's ability to decode.

### WHAT THE CHILDREN DO

- The check will take 4 to 9 minutes to complete.
- They will be asked to 'sound out' a word and blend the sounds together.
   e.g. d-o-g – dog. Sh-i-p - ship

The check will consist of 40 words and non-words. Children will be told if the word is a real or 'alien' word, with a corresponding alien image.



### HOW IT WILL TAKE PLACE

- Teachers will conduct all of the screening checks with the children in a quiet area of the school.
- The children are already familiar with this routine.

• Teachers are not allowed to tell children at the time of the check whether they have correctly sounded out and/ or blended the word.

#### THE RESULTS

- We will inform you of the results on your child's end of year report in the Summer.
- If your child's score falls below the national standard they will be supported and will complete the screening again in year 2.

### OTHER THINGS YOU CAN DO TO HELP...

- In school we are continually checking your children's phonic development within our approach to the assessment of reading. But there are a number of things that you can do to support early reading skill development at home.
- Let your child see you enjoying reading yourself they are influenced by **you** and what **you value**!
- Immerse your child in a love of reading: share books and magazines with your child, take them to the library to choose books, read to them regularly,.
- Make time for your child to read school books to you regularly. These are decodable and at their phonics level.
- Encourage them by pointing to the words and ask them about the story they are reading.

### **USE READING STRATEGIES**

Encourage your child to spot the tricky sound (using eagle eyes) in the word first, before they read it.

Single sounds:


#### WHAT ELSE YOU CAN DO TO HELP...
