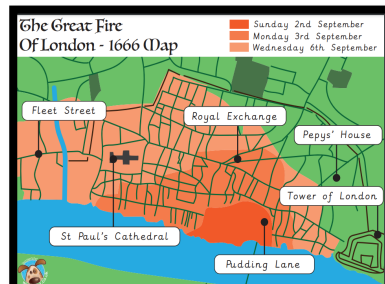

HISTORY: The Great Fire of London

Enquiry Question: How did London change after the Great Fire of London?

- The Great Fire of London started on Sunday 2nd September 1666 and was put out by Thursday 6th of September.
- In 1666, there was no Fire Brigade so ordinary people used leather buckets and water squirts to try to put the fire out but these did not work. Later in the week, King Charles II ordered buildings to be pulled down to stop the flames from spreading.
- Six people died as a result of the fire. Thomas Farriner's maid was the first person to die because she was too scared to jump from the burning building.
- It hadn't rained for months so the city was very dry. In 1666, lots of people had houses made from wood which burns easily. Houses were built too close together and there was no organised fire brigade.
- 13,200 houses were destroyed by the fire and 70,000 people were left homeless. Many left London to live elsewhere and some slept in tents.
- Samuel Pepys lived in London at the time of the Great Fire and wrote all about it in his diary. His eyewitness account is the source of our knowledge about the Great Fire and other key events in English history such as the Plague and King Charles II coronation.

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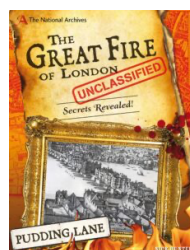
